PURPOSE

Nursing students are welcomed at Health Sciences North (HSN) and we are committed to fostering an environment that is conducive to the learning needs of the students while ensuring safe practice for our patients and staff.

POLICY STATEMENT

We want to provide a consistent and standard approach for clinical learning experiences that fosters a safe environment for students, patients and staff members who are undergoing "group placement" at Health Sciences North (HSN).

This policy refers to both Registered Nursing students in year 1, 2 and 3 of clinical placement as well as Registered Practical Nursing Students in year 2 of clinical placement.

PROCEDURE

Special Instructions

- Students will introduce themselves to their patients on initial patient contact. Should the patient refuse student involvement in their care, the assignement will be changed.
- Students can perform skills that they have received proper education and preparation for.
- According to the College of Nurses, "nursing students are accountable for their own actions to the patient, their educational institutions and to HSN".
- Student groups are **not permitted** to perform:
 - Advanced Nursing Skills (refer to "Advanced Nursing Skills" policy).
 - o Medical Directives (please refer to list of Medical Directives located on the HUB →Policies and Prodecures tab →Medical Directives tab
 - Point of Care Glucometer testing (Authorization for Use Point of Care found in Laboratory Standard Operating Procedures (Paradigm))
 - Independent double check (IDC) of medications (refer to "IDC of Medications for Adult patient policy" and IDC of Medications for Pediatric patients" policy).

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Method

Responsibility	Procedure or skills
Clinical Instructor	 Famililarizes self to the unit and to the patient population to be cared for. Selects student assignments in consultation with charge nurse or delegate which are relevant to the experience and needs assessment of the group. Communicates assignments and skills/tasks to be performed to nursing team (this can be accomplished by posting assignments in a strategic place on the unit) For patients whom are deemed A.O.B (Acting Out Behaviour) please speak to charge nurse re: appropriateness of assigning these patients Provides supervision as the assignments are carried out Reviews and evaluate students documentation Uses standards of practice and evidence-based knowledge to education the students Follows all HSN policies, procedures and guidelines
Nursing student	 Follows all HSN policies, procedures and guidelines including privacy policy, code of conduct, infection prevention and control. Wears their HSN ID badge in addition to their academic issued name tag. Obtains supervision and assistance from clinical instructor or registered staff for new and/or unfamiliar situations
List of skills are to be used as a guide – the student may not have all the required education to perform each skill depending on year/semester of academic year. All skills are to be done under supervision until the clinical instructor deems the student competent to perform on own.	Blood products:
	Dressing changes and drainage: Simple, dry, moist-to-dry, medicated dressing and/or wound packing below the dermis to stable wounds Removal of staples, sutures and application of steri-strips Emptying and measuring of drainage device Removal of drainage device Enteral feeds NG insertion for feeding – may monitor, do placement checks and may change bags and tubing. G-tube /J-tube-may monitor, change bags and tubing

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Medications:

- o Oral
- Topical
- Rectal (including enemas)
- Subcutaneous
- o Intramuscular
- Via N/G tube. G-tube/J-Tube
- o Inhalation/nebulizer
- Pre-filled subcutaneous anticoagulant (clinical instructor or RN/RPN needs to co-sign)

Nasogastic tube:

- o NG insertion for decompression
- o may monitor, do placement checks and measure output
- o removal

Ostomy care:

- Urinary ostomy care, measuring output and changing appliance
- Bowel ostomy care, measuring output and changing appliance

Oxygen therapy:

- Initiating and discontinuing nasal prongs based on physician order
- Caring for a patient on a simple mask, pendant, partial rebreather mask or nonrebreather mask, venturi mask if permitted
- Monitoring and titrating O₂ admin based on oximetry and physician order

Peripheral Intravenous lines:

- May hang, prime, change and regulate plain IV solutions or solutions containing up to 40 MeqKCl/litre
- Monitor site
- Flush saline lock with a prefilled 0.9% normal saline syringe
- o Discontinue saline lock or IV
- Administer medication above the drip chamber (this excludes Insulin, Heparin, Chemotherapy or any other high risk drug)

Restraints:

- Monitoring patients in restraints
- Application or removal

Mental Health and Addictions: students may only care for patients for whom restraints are in use for mobility or security from medical equipment not high risk behavior or secluded patients

Tracheostomy:

- Dressing change
- o Inner cannula care

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Definitions

- 1. <u>Clinical Instructor</u>: An indivisual employed byt the academic institution that supervised and guides a group of nursing students for the purposed of a clinical placement.
- 2. Group Placement: Two or more nursing students placed in a unit at the same time.
- 3. Nursing Student: An individual in an organized learning experience for placement.
